


# Guided Battlefield Tours



## Tour Rates

Tours allow visitors exclusive access to areas of the battlefield that are not open to the public.

# Guided Battlefield Tours

Experience Bentonville with a guided battlefield tour. Guided tours allow visitors to take an in-depth trip around the battlefield while learning about the three-day fight.

Battlefield tours are led by staff members and certified field guides. Tours take at least two hours and visitors are able to view areas of the battlefield not open to the general public.

The battle of Bentonville took place March 19-21, 1865. Gen. Johnston met Gen. Sherman in what would become the largest battle ever fought in North Carolina. Total casualties numbered more than 4,000. Bentonville was the last major Confederate offensive of the Civil War.

The battlefield covers over 6,000 acres. Today, over 2,000 acres are preserved by the state of North Carolina. While major areas of fighting are available to the public daily, battlefield tours offer unparalleled access to other portions of the battlefield, including original battle trenches.



### MILITARY STAFF RIDES

Staff rides allow military groups to experience the battlefield while developing their leadership skills.
